Dogs on beaches



Borough of Queenscliffe engagement report February 2023



More than 1,250 respondents from across the Borough and beyond let us know their thoughts on the potential changes to Council's dogs on beaches laws. Our community told us the myriad reasons for and against enacting these changes.

The findings gathered from the online survey have been presented to Councillors alongside outcomes from key stakeholder discussions and existing strategies. This information will be used to inform Council's decision-making on the matter.



respondents voted **no** 446 to the proposal




QUESTION 2

Protection of hooded plovers and wildlife bylaws

Concern was raised for the protection of fragile bird and marine life, particularly the hooded plovers which often nest on Point Lonsdale Back Beach, in **111** individual comments



A need for increased law enforcement, both in regard to the current laws and with potential to the proposed change, was listed in **79** individual comments

The following trends were also mentioned on enough occasions to be statistically relevant:

78 mentions of a need for more dog poo to be cleaned up

78 mentions of the potential to extend the existing off-leash area, including new dog parks

45 mentions of a lack of existing presence on beaches from bylaws officers
