Crossing off another pedestrian safety project

The Borough of Queenscliffe has been busy improving pedestrian safety across Queenscliff and Point Lonsdale, with the recent completion of a new pedestrian crossing in Gellibrand Street one of a number of new initiatives in town.

Completed in June as part of a partnership with the Transport Accident Commission (TAC), the crossing, located at the corner of Gellibrand Street and Hobson Street in Queenscliff, was supported by residents during Council consultation on road safety last year. Featuring a raised walkway, road narrowing, signage, and new lighting, the crossing will help pedestrians safely make their way from Queenscliff's shopping precinct to the beach or Princess Park.

Following a traffic investigation last year that found vehicles were regularly exceeding the speed limit, the benefits of this new crossing are already clear, with motorists slowing down and pedestrians enjoying an uninterrupted path across the road.

The works are just one of many pedestrian safety upgrades Council is making throughout the Borough, which will also include pedestrian crossings in Hesse Street, Queenscliff and on Point Lonsdale Road. Council's 2021–22 budget also includes funding for a detailed traffic study of Queenscliff's road network, aimed at helping Council respond to the way pedestrians, cyclists and cars move through the township.

Council thanks the TAC for their \$15,000 funding grant, which made the Gellibrand Street crossing possible. More information about these improvements is available at queenscliffe.vic.gov.au/ pedestrian-safety.

Climate plan adopted

Council has cemented its place as a climate response leader in the region after formally adopting a Climate Emergency Response Plan at its Ordinary Council Meeting in May.

The plan, which was developed in partnership with the community, commits to achieving zero net emissions by 2031, as well as interim steps including matching local electricity consumption with 100% renewable energy by 2025.

Council will achieve its zero-net emissions goal by completing or facilitating 49 individual actions laid out in the plan. Actions vary from solar bulk buys to a shared commitment to phase out single-use plastics throughout the Borough. Many actions involve partnerships, with community action playing a key role in achieving the targets. Council will now develop an implementation plan to further outline how each of the actions in the plan will be achieved.

The adoption of the CERP builds on existing actions the Borough of Queenscliffe has already taken to reduce its

climate impact, including switching all Council street lighting to energyefficient LEDs, entering an agreement to purchase 100% renewable energy for Council operations, and reducing its emissions by 34% since 2013.

Borough goes renewable thanks to state-wide collaboration

The Borough of Queenscliffe has joined forces with forty-five other Victorian councils by signing on to the Victorian Energy Collaboration (VECO), the largest ever emissions reduction project by local government in Australia.

The VECO, which officially began on 1 July 2021, will power 45 per cent of all Victorian councils' electricity requirements with renewable energy, reducing greenhouse emissions by 260,000 tonnes of CO2 every year. By joining the project, the Borough will power 100% of its total electricity use with renewable energy, including street lights, Council offices, caravan parks and the Town Hall.

Meeting all of its electricity needs with renewable energy is the most recent in a series of actions Council has taken to reduce its environmental impact. Other actions include installing energy-efficient lighting in Council buildings and street lights, and introducing a green waste service to divert more than 3,600 tonnes of rubbish from landfill since July 2015. Community infrastructure is at the forefront of the Borough of Queenscliffe's 2021–22 budget, which was officially adopted by Council at the Ordinary Meeting of Council in June

The budget, which includes \$1.3 million for new operating and capital projects, is highlighted by a \$360,000 investment in designing and renewing toilet and change facilities across the Borough. Point Lonsdale's Royal Park Oval has been allocated \$60,000 of funding to scope and design an upgrade, while a further \$20,000 will support the development of a concept design for a bike park.

Council's recently adopted Climate
Emergency Response Plan calls for a series
of actions to help its implementation, and
so \$150,000 has been allocated towards the
first tranche of initiatives outlined. Part of
this is the \$70,000 put towards installing
electric car charging stations in the Borough.

New fencing spruces up coastal path

Regular users of our Point Lonsdale walking trails will have noticed some welcome improvements over the past few weeks, with new fencing now installed on the path between Point Lonsdale Pier and the Rip View car park.

Council is replacing 100 lineal metres of old wire fencing with brand new timber along the path, beautifying the track while

keeping in line with its coastal feel. Forty metres have already been completed, with the rest to come later this financial year. The new fencing has also supported local jobs, with the works being completed by a Point Lonsdale-based contractor.

Further construction works along the path will be funded via Council's annual budget for improving beach access infrastructure.
