An ace new look for Point Lonsdale Tennis Club

Players at the Point Lonsdale Tennis Club can now take advantage of improved facilities after Council completed upgrade works to the local sporting precinct in November 2021.

With major funding for the project first announced in October 2018, extensive improvement works recently concluded at the club. Upgraded, more accessible clubrooms have been the centrepiece of the renovation, which have also included resurfacing two courts, and new LED lighting and poles for the remaining courts. Also installed is an online membership and court booking system, which the club notes has led to a 54% increase in court usage. Council held an official opening ceremony in November, attended by Member for Bellarine Lisa Neville, PLTC President Peter Callahan, representatives from Tennis Victoria, and a number of dedicated members of the tennis club. The project was supported by \$250,000 of funding from the Victorian Government, \$53,177 from the Point Lonsdale Tennis Club, and \$46,000 from Tennis Australia. The Borough of Queenscliffe provided \$30,000 of project funding, as well as project management for the upgrade works.

Borough seeks community input for Active Transport Strategy

The Borough of Queenscliffe's first Active Transport Strategy is now open for consultation, and Council is calling on residents to share their ideas to make the Borough more accessible for pedestrians and cyclists.

The Active Transport Strategy will guide Council's investment in walking, cycling and wheelchair

infrastructure, with the aim of encouraging residents to choose active transport as they make their way around the Borough.

The development of the strategy comes on the back of a range of investments by Council in pedestrian safety upgrades. In the past six months, Council has installed or supported new pedestrian crossings in the main shopping streets of Queenscliff and Point Lonsdale, as well as near popular beaches, parks and walking routes.

While Council has engaged a transport specialist to manage the strategy's development,

Help select our local award winners

The Borough of Queenscliffe is calling for expressions of interest to join a new reference group which assists in selecting the recipients of Council's yearly community service awards. The annual awards ceremony recognises and celebrates the many individuals, community groups and organisations that make outstanding contributions to the Borough.

Anyone who lives, works or volunteers in the Borough can be nominated for the awards, and a community reference group assesses these nominations before making recommendations to Council. The reference group is active for a period of two years, prompting a fresh call for new members this summer

- What is your current involvement and/or activity in the local community?

The idea for something new and innovative came from local traders, who have been significantly impacted by lockdowns and other pandemic restrictions over the past 12 months. The four-hour long extended street party closed off the main shopping strip of Point Lonsdale to vehicular traffic to allow revellers the opportunity to take in musical performances, outdoor dining and a visit from Santa Claus himself. Residents and visitors to the Borough had already been treated to new decorations which remained throughout the festive season, including large trees installed in the Queenscliff and Point Lonsdale shopping villages, and wreaths, bows and flags appearing in a variety of locations across town. The new festive features were supplied and installed by a Queenscliff local and represent Council's largest investment in new decorations in several years.

Adopting a new Council Plan

The Borough of Queenscliffe is now guided by its most extensive and detailed strategic framework to date, following the adoption of a new Council Plan in October 2021. Signed off two months after the introduction of a ten-year Community Vision, the Council Plan 2021–2025 sets out measurable goals and objectives for this four-year term of Council.

Steered by five overarching values – integrity, respect, community focus, sustainability, and openness – the Plan includes objectives for achieving Council's overall strategic direction, indicators to monitor how we are tracking against those objectives, and a description of Council's initiatives and priorities for services, infrastructure and amenity.

Much like previous Plans, Council's priorities are divided into five portfolios, with each the responsibility of an individual Councillor. Council's five portfolios (and their subsequent strategic objectives) for this four-year term are as follows:

- 1. Health and wellbeing: To support community wellbeing and encourage an active lifestyle
- 2. Environment: To protect our environment and address climate change issues
- Local economy: To support a prosperous and diverse local economy
- Heritage, planning and infrastructure: To protect our distinctive coastal, cultural and built environment, and provide sustainable, suitable infrastructure
- Governance and finance: To provide a financially viable Council that is accountable, transparent and practices good governance.

The Council Plan will be used to guide Council's actions over the coming four years. When devising new policies, programs or services, the Plan will be used as a companion document to guide decision-making, and will provide a key resource when measuring performance and resources.

Climate plan takes out top honour

The Borough of Queenscliffe's Climate Emergency Response Plan (CERP) has been officially recognised at the Climate Council's Cities Power Partnership Climate Awards by taking out the Community Choice Award.

Competing against seven other jurisdictions from across the country – including the ACT Government, Brisbane City Council and City of Adelaide – the Borough's efforts gained top marks in the publiclyvoted prize, held in November 2021.

The CERP, adopted at Council's Ordinary Meeting in May 2021, commits Council to support the community in achieving netzero emissions by 2031, as well as interim steps including matching local electricity consumption with a 100% renewable supply by 2025. Climate Council praised Victoria's smallest council for "punching above its weight in climate action", and highlighted the Borough's commitment to deliberate engagement with the Queenscliffe Climate Action Group (QCAG) in developing the Plan.

QCAG Founder and President Kitty Walker, whose team of volunteers were instrumental in generating community support for Council to first declare a climate emergency and then commit to developing a response plan, said the title was a fitting reward for the community after a challenging 18 months.

Council will now turn its attention to ticking off plenty more of the 49 individual actions to be completed or facilitated in the Plan, which vary from increasing the Borough's solar penetration, to community battery energy storage solutions, to the elimination of single-use plastics and environmental regeneration projects.

Mayor Ebbels re-elected

Borough releases draft Coastal Plan

The Borough of Queenscliffe has released a draft of its Coastal and Marine Management Plan, developed from ideas submitted by more than 270 community consultation participants. The Plan outlines how the Borough will manage its coastal landscapes over the long term and considers its entire coastline in a single strategy rather than a series of isolated locations.

Among the features of the plan is a pathway strategy, with consultation respondents highlighting walking and exercise as some of the most common reasons they visit the Borough's coasts. Other community-backed features include greater recognition of Wadawurrung and Borough heritage, auditing and preparing design standards for beach signage and infrastructure, and tailoring land management strategies on a precinct basis to respond to what residents most value about different coastal areas.
