Similarly, under the same Priority, the indicators should include a reduction in community emissions.	Council to consider. We appreciate that the Council Plan includes intended actions to partner with Wadawurrung Traditional Owners to develop an accredited Reconciliation Action Plan and to review and amend Council strategy, policy and operational documents to incorporate objectives of the Wadawurrung Country Plan. We note, however, that the CERP action to work in collaboration with Wadawurrung Traditional Owners to review and assess Wadawurrung cultural heritage is not included in the draft Council Plan. As noted in the CERP, the Wadawurrung Country Plan objective is for assessment of Wadawurrung Cultural Heritage along coastal country to be assessed by 2024 i.e., during the life of this Council Plan. If funding the assessments is a budget issue for Council, QCAG would like to work with Council to identify funding opportunities to help support this important work.		
The draft Council Plan includes two duplicate intended actions to implement the short-term actions in the CERP - one under the Environment Portfolio (2), Priority 2 and one under the Heritage, Planning and Infrastructure Portfolio (4), Priority 2. We assume that this is an oversight. Logically, it makes sense for this action to be included under the Environment Portfolio. If it's also included under the Heritage, Planning and Infrastructure Portfolio it could imply that this commitment is just to the short-term actions related to the two portfolios - Environment and Heritage, Planning and Infrastructure. We suggest amending the second reference to short term CERP action implementation in Portfolio 4 to be more specific.	Council to consider.
