More to sea at Point Lonsdale front beach

Beach lovers at Point Lonsdale have reason to smile after the Borough of Queenscliffe rebuilt a section of the front beach's ageing bluestone seawall in late March.

The wall, which had been continually battered by high tides and large waves over the decades, was identified to have structurally failed, thus requiring a restoration from Council contractors. A brand new concrete ramp and railing provides safe and easy access from street level down to the sand.

The ramp is a key access point to Point Lonsdale Front Beach, and by completing these works, people of all ages can enjoy the water for many years to come. Construction took around four weeks to complete, as all works were dictated by the movements of the tide.

Council thanks the Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning for funding the project, which we anticipate our community will get the most enjoyment out of this summer when we hopefully start to see a bit of normality.

The Borough of Queenscliffe continues to follow advice from the Department of Health & Human Services regarding the opening status of beaches, parks and other public areas during the coronavirus pandemic.

Pool registration reminder

In December 2019, the Victorian Government introduced a new mandatory registration scheme requiring all property owners, including landlords, with a pool or spa to register their pool/spa with Council.

Property owners are required to have their swimming pool and spa barriers inspected by a registered private building surveyor or registered private building inspector. If the barrier is found to be compliant with the applicable requirements, the registered building surveyor/inspector will issue a certificate of compliance to the owner. The owner must then submit a current certificate of compliance for their pool or spa safety barrier to Council. Fees apply.

The deadline is soon approaching. If you have a pool or spa on your property, you need to register before 1 June 2020.

Queenscliff celebrates Australia's first Indigenous cricketers

Queenscliff's significance in the 154-yearold story of the Australian Aboriginal cricket team was officially recognised in late February when the Borough of Queenscliffe was presented with a leather-bound commemorative message book.

The B Grade cricket fixture between Queenscliff and Anglesea at Queenscliff Recreation Reserve took on added meaning, as the teams competed for the Mullagh Wills Foundation Trophy. In a thrilling finish, the Coutas fell just three runs short of their target at the end of play, with one wicket in hand.

A ceremony took place prior to the match, where the message book was presented to Mayor Ross Ebbels alongside Wotjobaluk Elder Richard Kennedy. Mr Kennedy, whose great-great-grandfather Yangendyinanyuk (Dik-a-Dik) was of a member of the original Aboriginal cricket team, penned a bilingual Welcome to Country in English and Wergaia that is inscribed in the book. The book itself has journeyed to England and then across Australia over the last four years, making its final stop at Queenscliff before it finds a home at the Johnny Mullagh Cricket Museum in Harrow, Victoria.

The Queenscliff township's role in the story of the Indigenous team is pivotal, as it was from there where the squad departed in October 1867 for its 1868 tour of England. Having been prevented by the Central Board for the Protection of Aborigines to leave Victoria, the trip from Geelong to Queenscliff was disguised as a day's fishing. The team then boarded the Rangatira at Queenscliff, Sydney-bound, before then travelling to England where they played a mammoth 47-match tour over six months.

The Mullagh Wills Foundation is named after the Aboriginal side's star player Johnny Mullagh (born Unaarrimin) and coach Tom Wills, and was formed to promote and recognise the tremendous achievements of the team in the late 1860s.

New trees to be planted in Avenue of Honour

New trees will be planted in Queenscliff's historic Avenue of Honour for the first time in more than half a century, following a Council decision to plant new Monterey cypress trees.

Maintaining and replacing the stretch of more than 80 Monterey cypresses has been a long-term project for Council, and the most significant step yet in this process occurred at the November 2019 Ordinary Meeting, when a recommendation for planting in two of the Avenue's existing gaps was endorsed.

This recommendation was proposed by the Avenue of Honour Reference Group, a small pool of local citizens tasked with much of the decision-making around the Avenue's future. Following the advice of an independent arborist who provided the group with several options to replace the dying and diseased trees, the group opted to replace them with the same species: Monterey cypress.

Council's next step is to conduct an initial round of plantings in two of the Avenue's existing gaps to ensure they grow well next to mature trees and are resistant to disease. If these sample trees perform well over a trial period, Council will begin replacing the existing trees with the poorest health.



Construction begins at Point Lonsdale Surf Life Saving Club

A new clubhouse for a much-loved local club is now under construction after more than 100 members and dignitaries joined Mayor Ross Ebbels for a commemorative turning of the sod in March.

Council is proud to have played a major role in the project getting to this point, having donated this piece of prime real estate to the Club back in 2015. We look forward to seeing this finished product, which is estimated to be completed by December 2020.
