Community grants support the Borough's past, present and future

Council announced the recipients of its 2017-18 Community Development Grants program at a presentation evening held in the Queenscliff Town Hall on Thursday 3 August.

Grants were awarded to 11 local organisations to support community, art and cultural projects and activities that enhance the wellbeing and quality of life of people living in the Borough of Queenscliffe.

Cr Tony Francis, Borough of Queenscliffe Mayor, congratulated the grants recipients.

"Your contribution to the wellbeing of our community is invaluable and speaks volumes for your generosity of spirit," said Cr Francis. "This year's list of recipients is a true reflection of your commitment to the Borough's past, present and future." In total, Council awarded \$18,357.30 of the \$20,000 of grant funding available this year.

The Grants Program aims to encourage and assist community organisations to take an active involvement in the life of their community for the benefit of the community and its members, empower communities to become stronger and more economically, environmentally and socially sustainable, enhance leadership and develop a sense of pride, ownership and identity within communities.

Victorian Seniors Festival 2017

The 35th Victorian 2017 Seniors Festival kicks off on Sunday 8 October and runs until Sunday 15 October.

All sorts of events will be held across the state throughout October to celebrate our seniors and the valuable contribution of older people to our community.

Kids' art on display

Council held a Children's Summit in February 2017 to give the next generation of Borough residents the chance to have their say in the preparation of the 2017–2021 Council Plan, and students from Point Lonsdale Primary School, Queenscliff Primary School, St Aloysius Catholic Primary School and the Queenscliff Kindergarten rose to the challenge. During September 2017, artworks developed by the students at the Children's Summit will be on display in the foyer of Council's offices at 50 Learmonth Street, Queenscliff, to celebrate the valuable and creative ideas generated by our young people. The level of involvement of our younger residents in the consultation process has been particularly pleasing, and made a major contribution to the drafting of the 2017–2021 Council Plan.

Community Home Support Packages

Since 1996, the Borough of Queenscliffe has formed an alliance with the City of Greater Geelong, Colac Otway Shire and Surf Coast Shire to provide quality home care packages that assist older people to remain living independently at home for as long as possible.

Home care packages are funded by the federal Department of Health's Commonwealth Home Support Program and offer increased choice, flexibility and control in the way care and support is provided, as well as access to a full range of services to suit your needs. Our highly trained and experienced Community Care Workers will work closely with you to ensure services are tailored to suit you and support your quality of life.

Round Two Community Solar Initiative

Installation of solar systems purchased through Round Two of the Community Solar Initiative was completed in the final quarter of the last financial year.

A total of 40 solar systems were installed through the initiative. These will generate a combined 169 megawatt hours of solar power annually and reduce the community's carbon emissions by 169 tonnes every year! This is equivalent to supplying electricity to 35 houses in Victoria for 12 months or taking 49 cars off the road.

The project is an initiative of the Community Environment Alliance, a partnership of residents, schools, community groups and businesses working together to protect our environment and reduce carbon emissions.

The Community Solar Initiative was funded with the support of the Borough of Queenscliffe and the Victorian Government. Round One was successfully delivered in 2015 and saw 43 solar systems installed on homes, businesses and community buildings.

Message from the Mayor



I am pleased to announce that Council formally endorsed the 2017–2021 Council Plan, 2017–18 Implementation Plan and 2017–18 Budget at its Special Meeting on Thursday 10 August.

All three of these documents were unanimously endorsed by Council. Copies of the 2017–2021 Council Plan, 2017–18 Implementation Plan and 2017–18 Budget are available to view at Council's offices at 50 Learmonth Street, Queenscliff and can be downloaded from Council's website, www.queenscliffe.vic.gov.au.

The level of community involvement in the development of the new Council Plan,

Implementation Plan and Budget has been remarkable. On behalf of Council, I thank you all for your significant contribution to the shape and direction of future projects and immediate priorities.

In light of the aspirations of the Borough community identified during the consultation processes, Council applied to the Essential Services Commission (ESC) for a 4.5% variation to the rate cap in 2017–18. The ESC did not support our application, therefore Council approved a final 2017–18 Budget based on a 2.0% rate cap. We look forward to working with the community to progress the priorities identified in the final 2017–18 Budget.

We are making good progress with the upgrade of the Queenscliff Sport and Recreation Precinct, and have released a request for tender for civil works that includes:

- Demolition of existing buildings and infrastructure, including the cricket practice wicket;
- Earthworks and retaining wall;
- Construction of roadway, kerbing, footpath, car park and sporting facilities, including netball courts and cricket nets;

- Construction of underground utility services, including water, stormwater, sewer, electricals and communications;
- Installation of a playground; and
- Landscaping.

I look forward to providing further updates on this important and exciting project.

Council's strong performance results in the 2017 Local Government Victoria Community Satisfaction Survey are very encouraging, especially in light of our commitment to community consultation. We appreciate the clear positive messages from the Borough community regarding our service improvements and the opportunity to review areas for attention.

Strong results for new Council

The 2017 Local Government Victoria Community Satisfaction Survey results are in, and Council is very pleased to report an overall increase on the 2016 result.

Borough of Queenscliffe Mayor, Councillor Tony Francis, was excited to see such a strong performance improvement across the results, noting that this was the first set of service survey results received for the new Council.

"We are very happy that people are noticing our service improvements. The survey results also inform us directly regarding work that requires further attention by Council," said Cr Francis.

Local Government Victoria coordinates the commissioning of the Community Satisfaction Survey each year. The survey is conducted by phone with a minimum of 400 people throughout each municipality, including resident and non-resident rate payers.

The final report compares Council's performance to state-wide results drawn from 68 of the 79 Victorian councils, and to the survey scores of sixteen other Local Government Authorities in the small rural councils grouping, including the municipalities of Alpine, Ararat, Benalla, Buloke, Central Goldfields, Gannawarra, Hepburn, Hindmarsh, Indigo, Loddon, Mansfield, Murrindindi, Pyrenees, Towong, West Wimmera and Yarriambiack. The results of the survey demonstrate that the Borough of Queenscliffe continues to perform very strongly and rates higher than the statewide average on all core measures.

Council's overall performance index score of 66 is three points higher than the overall performance index score achieved in the 2016 survey, and significantly higher than both the small rural group average index score of 58 and the state-wide average index score of 59.

These results are significant for the new Council, which has a strong commitment to two-way communication with the Borough community in order to develop policy based on common understanding.

With an index score of 81, Council's positive performance in waste management continues. Council also performed strongly in appearance of public areas, with an index score of 80, and community activities and arts centres and libraries, both with an index score of 72.

The index score of 56 on overall Council direction is five points higher than Council's 2016 result in this area and higher than both the state-wide average and the small rural group average.

When asked to describe the best thing about Council, top responses included the location and the community atmosphere. As well as reporting on areas where Council is performing strongly, the survey results help Council to identify areas needing improvement. On another positive note, 13% of residents reported that no areas of Council's performance required improvement in the 2017 survey, compared to 6% in 2016. More people rate Council's overall performance as 'very good' (16%) compared to the proportion who rate it 'very poor' (3%).

However, survey responses highlighted community consultation, inappropriate development and communication as areas of performance with room to improve. This feedback has been reviewed by Council in order to identify opportunities for service improvement and intervention, both now and in the future.

Visitor Information Centre signs up as a Peninsula Partner

The Queenscliffe Visitor Information Centre has recently entered into a Peninsula Partnership with Searoad Ferries for 2017-18. This is a unique opportunity for the Visitor Information Centre to further showcase its service and Heritage Walk to over 800,000 passengers who travel on the ferry each year.

The Peninsula Partner program allows the Visitor Information Centre to display a brochure, receive a web listing, and feature in email marketing and packaging programmes to some 80,000+ subscribers. In addition the Visitor Information Centre is now equipped to sell ferry tickets to visitors, a service that will complement and add value to the overall visitor experience.

Changes to Tobacco Act affect local food businesses

Under changes to the Tobacco Act 1987 that came into effect on 1 August 2017, smoking is now banned in outdoor dining areas in Victoria.

This includes outdoor dining areas at hospitality venues, food fairs, and within 10 metres of food stalls and food vendors at organised events other than a food fair.

These changes will impact anybody who currently runs, or plans to run, a business or event that provides outdoor eating areas.

To help local operators adjust to the changes, the Borough of Queenscliffe is in the process of informing businesses and updating relevant Permits and Guidelines to comply with the new requirements.
